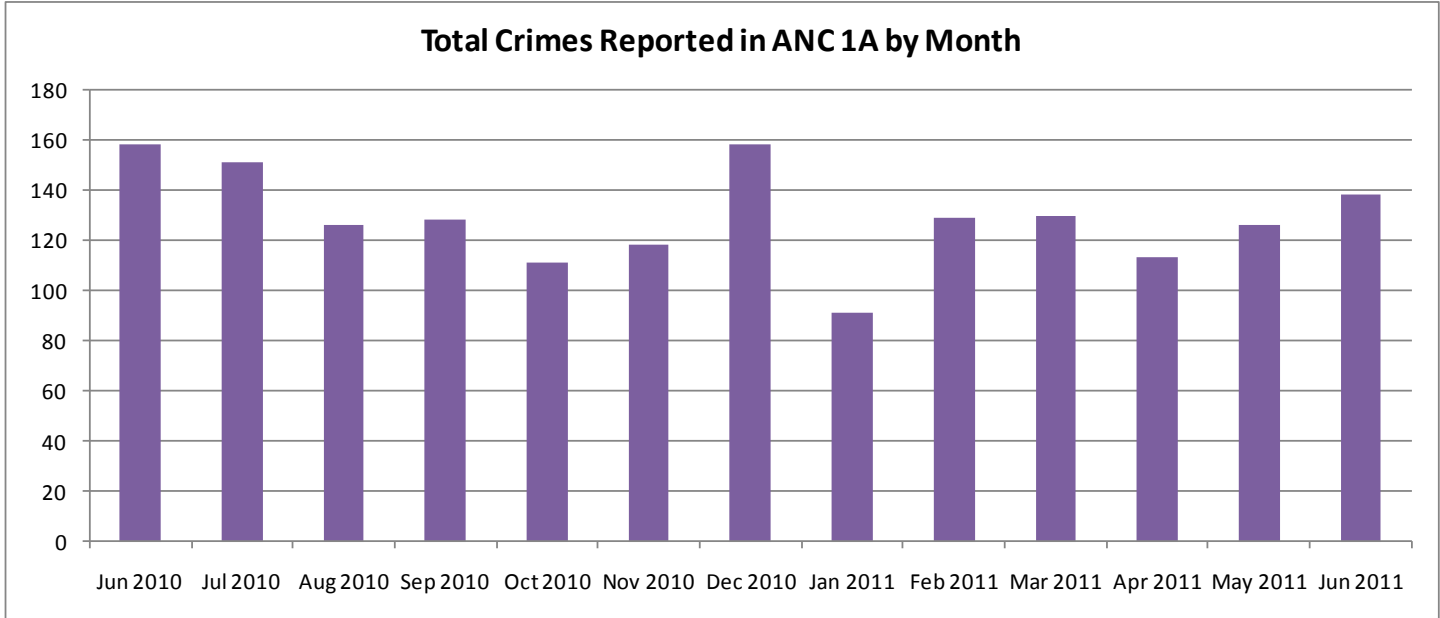


# ANC 1A Public Safety Committee Report for July 13, 2011

## Crime Reports for June:

Crimes, particularly thefts-from-auto, are down from this time last year, but still high and trending higher.



Home burglaries are trending up again. Force-and-violence-robberies are way up. Simple thefts and thefts-from-auto remain high.

The same defendants commit crime after crime, are arrested, sentenced and then released, only to commit more crimes. It's up to us to help "close the revolving door" and see that our system hands down meaningful sentencing, along with appropriate rehabilitation.

You can help by writing Community Impact Statements for criminal cases in your neighborhood. Here's the current list of cases tracked by CCJAI that are now **pending sentencing**, for ANC 1A and beyond.

*All of the defendants shown in the following table have either pled guilty or have been found guilty. The defendants will be sentenced by the courts on the Sentencing Date.*

Column Heading	Description
DCSC Case No.	DC Superior Court Case Number. Case information is available online: <a href="https://www.dccourts.gov/cco/">https://www.dccourts.gov/cco/</a>
Arrest Date	Date of arrest.
Sentencing Date	Date the defendant will be sentenced by the judge. Community Impact Statements must be submitted at least one week prior to the sentencing date. Two weeks prior to the sentencing date is the standard.
Defendant's Name	Name of the defendant who has pled guilty/was found guilty of the charge.
Age	The defendant's age. When young defendants are convicted of a felony but have only 1 or 2 adult cases, they may already be chronic repeat offenders in the juvenile system.
No of Cases	The number of defendant's papered arrests shown in the DC Superior Court's Online system. UNK=Unknown: When defendant's names are too common, it's not easy to tell how many cases are actually theirs and not someone else's.
Papered Lead Charge	Charge #1 for which the defendant is being sentenced. There may be additional charges.
Location of Offense	Address where the offense occurred. The address could be the block, the approximate address of the crime, where the suspect was arrested, where a warrant was served, or the police station/courthouse.
ANC SMD	The ANC Single Member District where the Location of Offense is. CCJAI needs ANC Commissioners to write Community Impact Statements and encourage others to write them too. We can reduce crime one SMD at a time.

Who Should Write a Community Impact Statement? You should...

- If you have any personal knowledge of the defendant or the actual crime
- If you live, work, or spend time in the neighborhood where a listed crime below was committed
- If you don't want similar criminal activity to continue in your neighborhood

What to Write?

- How has this crime affected you and those close to you?
- How has this crime affected your ability to perform your work, make a living, run a household, go to school, or enjoy any other activities you previously performed or enjoyed?
- How it is to be a member of the community where the crime has occurred?
- What is your recommendation for sentencing?

### Brief Narrative on Listed Closed Cases

#### Of the 23 ANC 1A closed cases:

- 15 were sentenced, and 7 were dismissed
- Of the 15 that were sentenced, 5 received no jail time, including two felony firearm possession cases (the notation "A/B" indicates a suspended sentence; where "A" is how much of the sentence the defendant is required to serve.)
- All 15 defendants who were convicted pled guilty (none went to trial)
- Of the 8 drug distribution arrests, 6 resulted in convictions. Of those 6, only 2 resulted in sentences longer than 12 months

#### Charges Don't Always "Line Up" with the Crime:

Defendants Antonio De La Rosa and Carlos Labrada were two of five defendants arrested on May 11, 2011 in association with a string of home burglaries. Carlos De Jesus Brito was also arrested, and subsequently charged with Burglary Two (see "New CCJAI Cases for May and June"). Also arrested were Jesus Lama and Infain Cruz; Lama is being prosecuted for Receiving Stolen Property, Cruz is not being prosecuted. Arrest charges were Unlawful Entry and Receiving Stolen Property. Sometimes the charge Unlawful Entry can indicate an attempted home burglary, and Receiving Stolen Property can indicate a burglary, robbery or theft from auto that can't be proved. Labrada and De La Rosa were sentenced and have been released.

Many car break-ins are prosecuted as "Destruction of Property Less than \$200," a low-end misdemeanor crime that usually results in no meaningful punishment. So far this year, 172 thefts-from-auto have been reported in ANC 1A, second only to simple thefts. Because theft-from-auto victims often neglect to report this crime to police, this number is probably grossly understated. There only a few arrests this year in ANC 1A for "theft-from-auto," although there are more than 30 for destruction of property. Still these numbers don't represent much of a police response to this prevalent crime that inconveniences so many people in our community.

#### Defendants Who Plead Guilty in Drug Distribution Cases Often Face Few Consequences:

Most drug distribution arrests result in a guilty verdict, usually achieved through a plea bargain. MPD's specialized units do a very good job of delivering solid cases for prosecution. However, once drug distribution cases are in court, there seems to be "fast-and-loose" treatment, as though they don't really matter because they're not perceived as violent crime. The community is the stated victim—we in the community are victimized in so many ways by the "by-products" of drug dealing in our midst. Where there is drug dealing, there are guns. Shootings are a natural consequence in communities where drug dealing is rampant. Also, home burglaries, robberies, car break-ins, and other quality-of-life crimes are common in ANC 1A's neighborhoods where the sale and use of crack cocaine, heroin, and PCP are prevalent. Unfortunately, judges generally hand down sentences that are in months, not years, even when the defendant has multiple current charges and/or a long criminal history including dozens of prior cases. If we want things to change, it is up to us to "weigh in" in these cases. It's our best opportunity to fight for change.

Plea bargains often negate the effect of MPD's solid drug distribution arrests. Both "Distribution of a Controlled Substance" and "Possession with Intent to Distribute" are felony charges. (Possession of a Controlled Substance, also known as simple possession, is a misdemeanor). DC's criminal justice system seems to unduly reward defendants for pleading guilty. Often, Possession with Intent to Distribute is pled down to simple possession. The maximum sentence for misdemeanor crimes is six months, yet it is within judges' discretion to grant any portion of the 6-month maximum, or no jail time at all (a suspended sentence). When sentences (or portions of sentences) are suspended, it is on the condition that the defendant adheres to probation conditions. Probation conditions can include drug testing, maintaining employment and other similar conditions to encourage ex-offenders to live productive lives and to avoid new arrests.

### Definitions and Key to Abbreviations:

Release Conditions	<p>Because those who are arrested are presumed innocent until proven guilty, defendants in criminal cases are granted the least restrictive release conditions allowable until their case is resolved. Most defendants are released on personal recognizance (PR). Additional restrictions are placed on defendants in cases of violent crimes or if there is reason to doubt the defendant will adhere to more lenient release conditions.</p> <p>Abbreviations:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• HWOB: Held Without Bond (incarcerated)</li> <li>• HOC: Held on Other Charges (incarcerated)</li> <li>• PR: Personal Recognizance (out)</li> <li>• PR-HISP: Personal Recognizance-High Intensity Supervision Program</li> </ul> <p>More About Release Conditions:</p> <p>Other conditions of release could include the following restrictions: halfway house, work release, drug testing, stay away order (from a location or person), curfew</p>
FTA/BWI - Bench Warrant Status	<p>Failure to Appear/Bench Warrant Issued</p> <p>A defendant is in bench warrant status when s/he does not appear for a scheduled court date. Unfortunately, many CCJAI defendants are currently in bench warrant status—even some with pending felony charges and long criminal histories (see “CCJAI Defendants in Bench Warrant Status in the DC Superior Court System.”)</p>

## **10 Things You Can Do Right Now to Fight Crime**

### **1. Don't make yourself an easy target for crimes**

- For your own good, it's important to follow tried-and-true crime prevention tips. Prevalent crimes in our area are home burglaries, thefts-from-autos, robberies, and petty thefts.
- Since many robberies happen late at night, be especially cautious if you're out past midnight. If a stranger approaches you, do not engage in conversation. Stay on well-lit main roads where there are lots of people, or take a cab.
- As much as possible, don't carry or display items attractive to thieves. Cell phones, iPods, watches, wallets and cash, are reported stolen often.
- Robberies occur at all times of day, so be aware of your surroundings at all times while walking or while on the Metro. Avoid talking on the phone as you walk or in public places. Pay attention to your surroundings--criminals often target victims who appear distracted. If something or someone seems suspicious, trust your instincts, and go to a safe place (if possible). Report suspicious behavior to the police.
- To avoid having your car broken into, never leave anything of value in plain view--use the trunk or the glove compartment. Be sure that GPS devices, laptop computers, purses, backpacks, cell phones, cameras, iPods, coats, sunglasses, and even spare change are out of sight. If possible, put valuables in the trunk before you arrive at your final destination so that watching thieves won't see. Leave these items at home when they are not needed.
- To avoid home burglaries, remember to take all the usual precautions (sturdy locks for doors and windows, alarm systems, lighting, etc.) Use extra security measures when you're on vacation.
- At the gym, secure your belongings with a sturdy lock.
- Never leave purses, wallets, cell phones or electronics unattended in public places like restaurants.

### **2. Report every crime with a 911 call**

- Take the time to report every crime to the police. If responding officers are reluctant to take your report, don't take "no" for an answer. If no officer responds, go to the police station if you have to. Crime reports drive metrics that affect police presence in our communities.
- Based on DC's change in policy in January 2008, any time you want police to respond, call 911 (not 311). Don't worry that your complaint isn't serious enough to warrant a 911 call. 911 operators prioritize the calls so that life-or-death situations get top priority.

### **3. Before calling 911, get your facts straight**

- Communications with the MPD can be improved if we keep a few guidelines in mind. Be prepared to supply the following information to the 911 dispatcher; write it down before calling if possible. Remember to stay calm, and be prepared to repeat the information if needed. If you can't get all the information, get as much as you can, but still place the call.
  - Nature of Complaint: Be prepared to name the crime that you are reporting. In addition to serious and violent crimes such as robbery or assault, "suspicious activity" is a valid complaint for requesting a police response. "Suspicious activity" can describe any unusual behavior that appears to be criminal. Noise and public disturbance are other good descriptions for behaviors that require a police response. Public drinking, public urination and public drunkenness are also reasons to call the police.
  - Description of suspects: how many, and for each, age, race, height, description of clothing & shoes, any other information that you can supply: (example: [race and complexion], about 30 years old, short hair, moustache, tattoos on neck, 6'1", 200 pounds, blue jeans, black jacket, red shirt, white sneakers, black baseball cap)
  - Description of car: (make, model, color, license plate number, year, condition or distinguishing characteristics)
  - Location and direction: Give a street address or an intersection. If the suspect is moving, give the direction, for example, northwest corner of 14th Street and Meridian Place NW, traveling east on foot
  - Time and observations: If the complaint includes a chain of events that happened over time, please be prepared to give the timeframe for each event
- When you call 911, give your name and phone number and agree to be "interviewed" (called back) by the police. Often the police need additional information. If you don't leave your name and phone number, it gives the wrong impression to the police, like you're not really committed to resolving the issue. The police will sometimes behave accordingly.
- If you are the victim of a crime or a witness, be prepared to cooperate fully with the police and prosecutors if the case goes to court.

### **4. Become a Neighborhood Watch Block Captain**

- Through Neighborhood Watch, we will take back our neighborhoods one block at a time. Criminals are no match for a concerned network of active neighbors. Crime wouldn't stand a chance if there were a Block Captain on every block in ANC 1A. ### **5. Get more involved in the community**

- Find ways to do community service and become more active in community affairs. When we neighbors are visible and aware, those engaging in criminal activity are at a disadvantage. Spend time doing community service and encourage your neighbors to do the same. Support community events. Organize a neighborhood cleanup or a community garden. Get to know all your neighbors.

### **6. Participate in Criminal Case Tracking & Other Criminal Justice Matters**

- Write community impact statements to let judges know how crime in your neighborhood affects you and your family. Visit the courts to observe trial proceedings.
- Become familiar with the repeat offenders in your neighborhood and report violations of release conditions to the police.
- Do your Jury Duty service.

### **7. Attend Monthly Advisory Neighborhood Commission Meetings**

- The ANC represents its constituents in matters of public safety. Please attend meetings regularly, keep in touch with your Commissioner, and raise public safety concerns. To find out when and where your ANC meetings are, please check the ANC calendar. (Scroll down and click the link for your ANC).

### **8. Join ANC 1A's Public Safety Committee**

- The Public Safety Committee takes on tough issues like truancy, youth crime, repeat offenses, and access to crime information. Members get to know each other better, make contact with problem-solving resources and stand stronger together against common problems.

### **9. Attend MPD PSA Monthly Community Meetings**

- MPD PSA meetings are a great opportunity to get to know police officers and discuss our concerns face-to-face. Please visit the MPD Website's Calendar to find out when and where the next PSA meeting will be.

### **10. Sign up for MPD's Yahoo Listserv**

- Follow the instructions the MPD 3D website under "Email Discussion Groups." Become more aware and involved by reading e-mail reports on crimes, arrests, and other community news.
